Company Roles

To use a team sports metaphor, the company of The Village Hall requires a "very deep bench". To make the village and the hall believable, it has to be populated by realistic characters. Fortunately, everyone portrayed by the company will be someone you know very well. Most company members will be required to play at least three different characters through the course of the show.

You might be one of the yoga group - maybe its stressed out leader Pam.

Possibly a line dance enthusiast - or their leader who attempts but fails to do a mid-west american accent.

Taking things easy with the Chairobics and Silver Surfers groups. Their leader Dot heads the company number 'I'm Doing Fine' which has nine verses sung by nine different group members.

A life drawing class attendee, or maybe one of the Highland Dance group they do battle with. Carol is the singer of 'They'll Never Take Away Our Freedom' caught in the melee.

There's Freya who delivers a passionate solo about bourbon biscuits and there are two others at the literary circle.

A full hockey team charges through for the massive company number 'Wherever I Hear Music' - along with their long-suffering kit-carrier.

And the whole village is present for the Cheeley Players' panto rehearsal featuring the massive company number, 'Together'.

And there's lots more to enjoy.

For the auditions, even if you're reading for a specific company member, we'd like you to perform the first speech of a very pissed-off 'Pam' whose Yoga group has been waiting outside in the rain for the hall to open. There's also a couple of verses of a song called 'I'm Doin' Fine' - a song about ageing.

The important thing with the song is to make sure the comedy comes across. Use loose timing to present the lines with as much clarity and comedic delivery as you can.

PIECE 1 - pg. 5-6

Pam (soaked) is pushed through the doors by the villagers.

Pam (insistently) Excuse me. Can we come in now?

Frances Oh Pam. Good. Quick question. Do you think they'd be very upset if we cancelled yoga?

Pam fires Frances a look of venom.

Pam

Seventy three minutes... (she wipes the rain off her sopping phone with one sweep) ... seventy four minutes we've had "It's usually open Pam", "This is chaos Pam" and "Can we break in through the toilet window, Pam?". It stopped raining at quarter past. Things were looking up. Then at twenty-past – it started hailing. But that lot stood firm. "When's someone coming Pam?", "Where are they all Pam?", "Who's got the keys Pam?". And then, the thunder and lightning started and it was "What if I get struck by lightning Pam?", "Health and Safety Pam" and "Is Deidre's luminous golf brolly a potential lightning rod Pam". And now you are inside. And they are outside. Like the brave of Babylon after the final flood. So yes... yes... I think they'd be upset, very upset, cataclysmically upset if I popped out there and said 'see you next week?'... Has that answered your question?

Everyone is gawping at Pam.

Pam Good. Now would you answer mine? Can we come in now?

Mel Of course you can.

Mel dashes to the door.

Come in everyone. So sorry about the delay.

The remaining drenched villagers push in – including Helen - carrying brightly coloured yoga mats, towels (which they use to dry themselves) and water bottles. Christine is carrying a pod-type speaker. The villagers prepare for their yoga session placing the mats in a circle.

I'll open the fire door too. Give us a bit of fresh air.

Pam (sarcastically) Oh yes, that's just what we need. More fresh air.

Mel humbly exits to the fire door.
